

FATHER THOMAS A. JUDGE

OUR HISTORY


Driven by love for God and deep compassion for those in need, Father Thomas Augustine Judge dedicated his life to preserving the Catholic faith and calling all believers to evangelization. Born in 1868 to Irish immigrants in Boston, he was ordained a Vincentian priest in 1899 and began ministering to poor immigrant communities struggling in their faith. Recognizing the laity's vital role in spreading the Gospel, he encouraged all Catholics to live as apostles.



In 1909, he founded the Missionary Cenacle Apostolate in Brooklyn, New York, fostering a movement of lay missionaries. In 1915, he was sent to Alabama, where he established a community he named "Holy Trinity." There, he founded the Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity, a congregation of women religious, followed by the Missionary Servants of the Most Holy Trinity, a congregation of priests and Brothers. His vision of empowering laypeople to serve the Church took root and flourished.

What began as a small movement soon spread across both the northern and southern United States, inspiring more people to embrace the missionary spirit. Over the years, the Missionary Cenacle Family continued to grow, deepening its commitment to serving the poor and spiritually abandoned.

Now, more than a century later, Father Judge's legacy endures through Trinity Missions. With 43 missions across seven countries in the Americas, we continue his mission of bringing Christ's love to those most in need. Though the full impact of this work may never be known, it is through the generosity and faith of our supporters that we carry forward his vision, ensuring that no one is forgotten and that the Faith remains alive for generations to come.





TODAY WHAT WE DO

As pastors and teachers, chaplains and counselors, we serve wherever the need is greatest. Our missionaries bring Christ's love to schools, prisons, hospitals, and remote communities that have gone years without a priest. We care for the sick and elderly, offer hope to the imprisoned, and provide food and clothing to those struggling to survive. Whether in bustling cities or isolated villages, our mission remains the same: to share the Gospel, serve the forgotten, and be a living witness to God's love in the world.



















MINISTRY MEDICAL CLINICS



Access to healthcare is a fundamental human right, yet many communities lack basic medical services. Trinity Missions addresses this gap by providing medical care in underserved areas.

Our mission medical units in Mississippi, Mexico, Honduras, Haiti, and Colombia bring healthcare directly to remote regions by hosting health fairs or having regular hours in a location nearby for people to visit. They offer services such as vaccinations, prenatal care, pediatric, dental and vision, psychiatric, women's health, and general health check-ups.

Annually, we collectively treat approximately 42,000 people. In the United States, our missions collaborate with local health providers to offer free clinics, focusing on preventive care and health education. These efforts not only improve physical well-being but also restore dignity to those who might otherwise feel neglected.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

Hunger is more than an empty stomach. It is the uncertainty of where the next meal will come from and the pain of feeling forgotten. At Trinity Missions, we believe that no one should go without the food they need to survive and thrive.

In communities across the United States and beyond, our food assistance programs bring hope to families struggling to make ends meet. We operate food pantries, soup kitchens, and grocery delivery services in neighborhoods where hunger is a daily reality. These programs do more than provide nourishment; they restore dignity, build community, and remind people that they are not alone.

In Chicago, our food bank goes even further, growing fresh produce in a mission-run garden, ensuring that families receive locally grown, nutritious food. In Haiti and Honduras, where food insecurity is devastating, we stand as a lifeline for the most vulnerable, bringing sustenance and comfort to those with nowhere else to turn.

Annually, we feed 35,000+ through food pantries, delivery, and other methods in the United States (Chicago, Los Angeles, Alabama, Mississippi), Honduras, Mexico, and Colombia.

MIGRANTS

Trinity Missions serves migrants at 14 of our missions both in the United States and abroad, offering compassionate care to those seeking safety, stability, and dignity.

Along the Arizona border and in southern California, we partner with nonprofits and volunteers to provide food, water, clothing, and prayer to those crossing the desert.

In Alabama, California, Mississippi, and New Jersey, our missionaries walk alongside migrant families and farm workers, offering spiritual support, legal guidance, and education about their rights.

In Chicago, we minister to the growing Venezuelan community, many of whom carry the trauma of what they fled.

Through emotional support and essential services, we help them find hope, healing, a smile, and human kindness. At every mission, we meet Christ in the faces of the displaced.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE RECOVERY



The scourge of addiction devastates individuals and communities alike. In response, Trinity Missions has developed several comprehensive recovery programs to support those battling substance abuse.

iTHIRST

Our iTHIRST Initiative provides training and certification for spiritual companions to help equip parishes and dioceses with the knowledge and resources they need to accompany individuals in recovery and their families.

This past year, the iTHIRST Initiative brought Christ's healing presence to more than 230 individuals through its Spiritual Companionship Training in both English and Spanish. These trained companions now serve across 44 U.S. states and 10 countries, offering spiritual support to those impacted by addiction.

From rural parishes to seminaries and detention centers, iTHIRST has expanded its mission with initiatives like the Hope Zone recovery fellowship, the Community of Hope and Healing for grieving families, and a growing iTHIRST Africa network. The mentorship of a therapeutic community in Nigeria and the deeply moving Black Poster Project at the Shrine of St. Joseph further demonstrate the initiative's reach and heart.

Additionally, our recovery ministry located in northern New Jersey, has served over 1,000 men and women and their families recovering from alcohol or opioid addiction. This program offers a path to sobriety, prepares individuals and parishes to be spiritual companions and better prepares the Church to respond with hope and understanding of this disease.

We now operate Trinity House, a residential sober community for 10-15 men. The program offers those who qualify a home in which to reside, counseling, spiritual guidance, opportunities for employment, and community support, embodying our commitment to healing and restoration.

PITTSBURGH

This recovery ministry serves about 1,000 individuals each year with a whole-person approach to healing. Weekly gatherings support emotional and mental wellness, while programs offer practical tools such as financial literacy, life-skills training, and mentoring. Participants also find joy and connection through recreational activities like a sober game room. Local partnerships and volunteers help ensure that those in recovery are not only overcoming addiction but also rebuilding their lives with dignity and hope. This ministry creates a safe and supportive space where transformation is possible and each person is reminded of their worth and capacity to heal.





MINISTRY **EDUCATION**



Education serves as a cornerstone for personal and community development. Trinity Missions is deeply invested in educational programs that empower individuals and foster self-sufficiency. In Haiti, for example, we have grown a fledging school, the Altagrace School in Paredon, providing quality education to children who might otherwise lack access to learning opportunities. Currently there are more than 200 students enrolled at the school, with more families moving to the area from dangerous cities to access this tremendous asset.

In the United States, our missions offer after-school programs, literacy classes, summer camps, and vocational training, equipping participants with skills essential for economic independence. We provide these programs in many missions throughout the U.S. By focusing on education, we aim to break the cycle of poverty and inspire hope for a brighter future.

NATIVE AMERICAN OUTREACH

Preserving the Catholic faith among Native American communities requires cultural sensitivity and dedication. Trinity Missions operates missions in Mississippi and Arizona, focusing on faith preservation and community support. These missions engage in activities such as religious education, community building, and cultural exchange, ensuring that the rich traditions of Native American Catholics are honored and sustained.

YOUTH PROGRAMS AND GANG INTERVENTION

Trinity Missions offers transformative youth programs in Alabama, Mississippi, and Haiti, creating safe and faith-filled spaces for children in need. Through after-school activities and summer day camps, we provide not only educational and recreational opportunities but also nutritious meals for children whose families may struggle to afford daily food. These programs offer more than just structure, they offer hope. By giving young people a healthy, supportive environment rooted in faith and compassion, we help them grow in dignity, stay off the streets, and discover their potential.

In addition, urban areas often grapple with gang violence and limited opportunities for youth. We confront these challenges head-on by offering rehabilitation programs for gang members in Los Angeles. These initiatives provide alternatives to gang life through education, mentorship, and job training, thereby steering young individuals toward positive futures.



ASSISTING ELDERLY PRIESTS AND BROTHERS

For decades, the priests and Brothers at the Fr. Judge Missionary Cenacle in Silver Spring, MD, dedicated their lives to spreading the Gospel, serving the poor, and bringing Christ's love to the most forgotten. Now, in their later years, they face the realities of aging and health concerns. Many of these men have spent years ministering in challenging conditions, from remote villages to inner-city neighborhoods, often sacrificing personal comfort for the sake of their mission. Today, seventeen men reside in a community of faith, where they receive meals, medical care, and the support they need to live out their golden years in dignity. Just as they once cared for others, it is now our turn to care for them.



WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

Women often face unique challenges, particularly in marginalized communities. Trinity Missions is dedicated to empowering women through various initiatives. Our women's centers provide safe havens for those escaping abuse or dealing with homelessness, offering resources such as counseling, job training, and childcare.

In Colombia and Honduras, we offer sewing clinics and teach women vital business rules in order to give them the tools required to become independent entrepreneurs. These are skills that women will use again and again. By focusing on women's empowerment, we strengthen families and communities, fostering environments where everyone can thrive.





FOSTERING VOCATIONS

A vibrant Church depends on the active participation of both clergy and laity. At Trinity Missions, we are committed to fostering vocations and forming missionary leaders, both ordained and lay, who serve with compassion and faith.

Answering the call to missionary life is a sacred journey that requires prayer, discernment, and deep formation. Our process begins with the Vocation Promotion stage, where men learn about our charism and way of life while we accompany them in their initial discernment. Those invited to continue enter the Pre-Novitiate, living in community and growing in their relationship with Christ. The Novitiate offers a focused period of spiritual development and guidance. After professing first vows, each man enters the Post-Novitiate for further academic, apostolic, and spiritual formation tailored to his gifts and calling.

Our formation houses in Chicago, Mexico, Costa Rica, and Colombia nurture future priests and Brothers preparing to serve the poor and abandoned with humility and love.


TOTAL REVENUE, FY25


